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## **1.0 ABOUT CEIL WEST NILE**

**CEIL** is a registered non-profit organization, operating within Arua and Nebbi districts with focus on promotion of self-reliance and livelihood for the vulnerable youth, women and persons with disabilities (PWDs) as well as rehabilitation through enhanced physiotherapy services and assistive devices within Arua with the technical support of the Physiotherapy Unit in Arua Regional Referral Hospital.

As part of our concern is to raise awareness and promote social integration and peaceful co-existence through sports for the vulnerable- youth and PWDs alike both in schools and the community.

CEIL is an implementing agency and depends on funding from both public and private sources. The development partners that funded our maiden project in the first year (2017) and walked the path closely with the organization in the year 2017 were, Africa & Sport- Italy together with Friends from Milano- Italy.

At CEIL, we strongly believe in promoting livelihood for the society's marginalized, and underprivileged. Key among our beneficiaries are persons with disabilities (children and adults alike), vulnerable youth and women. Typical of our approach is inclusiveness as a means to promote coexistence for our beneficiaries as consumers of our services and most importantly as members of their respective communities. We promote this through rehabilitation and equal access to treatment, socio-economic services and fighting stigma in the society. This enormous task is made possible with concerted efforts at various levels within the sub region; mainly Arua and Nebbi districts.

Commitment and collaboration between all actors is emphasized to enable our beneficiaries lead improved quality of life, become self-reliant and be active and self-reliant members of society.

- iii. To enhance agricultural production through promoting modern farming practices, value addition and produce marketing.
- iv. To promote environmental protection through environmental education, use of renewable energy and support climate change mitigation strategies.
- v. To promote primary healthcare by focusing on maternal and child health, reproductive health, prevention of communicable diseases, HIV/AIDS and malaria.

- vi. To promote education by focusing on skills training, and inclusive learning, infrastructure development, functional adult literacy and performance enhancement through stakeholder engagements and provision of model services.
- vii. To promote development and social integration through sports
- viii. To provide a platform for the public to advocate on issues of corruption, civic engagement on political and electoral processes and the role of citizens as well as their leaders to promote accountability.

## 2.0 OVERVIEW OF PROJECTS

In the year 2017, CEIL implemented the first ever Projects, in Arua and Nebbi: **“Promoting Rehabilitation and Sports for the Persons with Disabilities and livelihood enhancement for vulnerable, women, youth and PWDs in Arua and Nebbi Districts** with a budget of 10,850 Euros jointly funded by Africa and Sport and Friends from Milan coordinated by Maria Rosaria Ferrauti

**Project duration:** Thirteen Months (from December 2016- December 2017)

**Project Objective** “To contribute towards social inclusion of the persons with disabilities through access to physiotherapy services, mobility enhancement and participatory events such as sports and enhanced livelihood through promoting income generating activities for the vulnerable”

- Activities –
  - Support to Physiotherapy for the clients through follow-up by the Physiotherapist and provision of walking aides
  - Implementing support to on-going sports and games for the visually impaired in the Schools and Ediofe Girls, Arua Demonstration Primary Schools) and Angal Girls Primary School for the blind
  - Livelihood enhancement through simple products production (IGA) by the disabled and the vulnerable women and youth

CEIL project 2017 in Arua was fully supported by the friends from Milan on the one hand and the organization Africa & Sport on the other– all from Italy

Here on ground, the project was implemented in collaboration and close relationship with various stake holders namely, The Arua District Union of persons with disability, the district Community Services Department of Arua, the Education Office- Special needs education in Arua. These collaborations reflect CEIL’s commitment to work with established institutions of government in the delivery of services to the vulnerable community for sustainability and able guidance.

The implementation of the project covered the areas of medical rehabilitation through enhanced physiotherapy, Social integration through sports both in the community and the Schools for the disabled and support to economic livelihood for the disabled and the vulnerable women and youth.

#### **a) PHYSICAL REHABILITATION FOR THE DISABLED**

The rehabilitation was designed to benefit persons with physical disability within Arua. The implementation was in the form of

- Home visits by the Physiotherapist,

- Support to appropriate Referrals for proper management and attention and
- Support to assistive devices (Elbow and Axillary Crutches).

### **Home Visits:**

Through this program, the physiotherapist from the regional referral hospital was supported to reach up to the homes of the clients and perform physiotherapy at home, advise the clients and parents or guardians at home on the management of disability cases. The focus was on children and adults as well.

### **Support to Provision of Walking Aides (Crutches and Wheel Chairs)**

Addressing mobility needs for the disabled is a crucial aspect of their rehabilitation. Assistive devices often present a huge challenge to the many disabled who cannot easily afford to acquire one for themselves. In this project CEIL was able to support up to 49 clients with crutches (Elbow and Axillary) either single or double! The need is so enormous that we had to double the number of pairs we initially planned at the start of the project!

Meanwhile for the wheel chairs, CEIL participated in mobilizing clients to benefit from wheel chairs provided by the rotary club of Nsambya – Kampala in collaboration with that of Arua. With the physiotherapist we mobilized up to 17 beneficiaries for the wheelchairs, other beneficiaries were mobilized by respective Community Development Officers of their respective sub-counties and at least 63 clients benefitted from Arua District. Other Wheel chairs were given to PWDs from other districts within the West Nile Region. Many thanks to the Rotary Club both in Arua and Nsambya –Kampala for the gift of mobility to the PWDs.

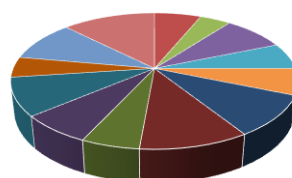
### **Other Assessments by the Physiotherapist**

The conditions that could not be managed by Physiotherapist locally were referred for higher management. Most common and within our means were Cleft Lip/palate cases, few hydrocephalus cases and spina bifida. We thank the parents and guardians for their collaboration in the efforts to cause a change in the lives of their loved ones. Below is the table showing the number we supported for higher management.

The hydrocephalus cases were supported to go for treatment to Mulago on appointment with surgeons from CURE hospital in Mbale. Meanwhile the cleft lip and palate patients were supported to undergo plastic surgery at Mulago with the collaboration and support from Smile Care international. Our role was only to facilitate their mobilization by the physiotherapist and ensure that they travel on the appointed dates. We are grateful for the efforts of all actors and service providers in this area without whom we would not do much!

**b) SUPPORT TO SOCIAL INTEGRATION THROUGH SPORTS AND GAMES AND OTHER CO-CURRICULA ACTIVITIES FOR THE DISABLED**

As part of CEIL activities in the year 2017 was promoting social integration for the disabled through enhancing sports activities within the inclusive communities. This took place in both the school settings in Ediofe Girls Primary Section for the blind in Arua and Angal Girls primary School in Nebbi District. Through this activity the disabled children were supported to participate actively in the school games and sports. Usually the sports for the disabled (especially the visually impaired) requires much prio preparations for the safety of the participants, hence requiring extra motivation on the part of the trainers and even the participants themselves.

CEIL was also enabled to organise friendly competitions between Angal Primary in Nebbi district and Ediofe Girls primary school that teamed up Arua Demonstration Primary School. On the 7th of July 2017, the sports team from Angal –Nebbi District visited the team at Ediofe for sports friendly competition which was preceded by debate on the topic, **Inclusive education should be Promoted!**

We are grateful to have facilitated this kind of meaningful interaction at academic level for the visually impaired pupils. The event which was graced by the Arua District Special Needs Education Officer as guest of honour was the first of its kind that a visiting team for debate came from an inclusive school in the neighboring district.

The colourful debate was crowned in the afternoon with series of friendly games and sports activities by the visually impaired. These included, Search and Seek Game (see the photo below)

These interactions strengthened the relationship between the participating schools to the extent that it was highly proposed to take place as annual event. Hence in the coming year 2018, Ediofe Girls school of the blind will hopefully visit Angal Primary school of the blind for similar activities.

We are happy to note that in addition to interaction by the pupils, the event enabled the staff on both sides to share their experiences and strengthen one another.

**c) SUPPORT TO REPAIR AND MAINTANANCE OF PERKIN’S BRAILLE MACHINES FOR THE BLIND**

In addition to the support to sports, CEIL also promoted learning for the visually impaired by facilitating the repair and servicing of the Perkins Braille machines used for writing. With the techical help of one of the passionate head teachers – **Mr.Jude Afema** from Arua District, we were able to respond and keep the few braille machines in working condition.

In collaboration with Amici di Angal, CEIL supported the technician to do these repairs in Angal as well in the presence of the teachers in-charge of the blind section so as to enable them learn tips of routine maintainance.

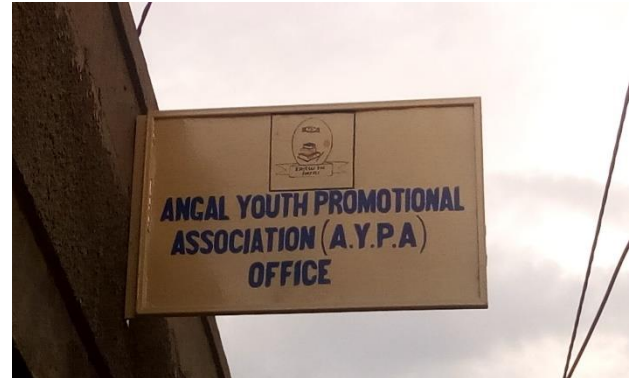

#### **d) COLLABORATIVE ACTIVITIES WITH AMICI DI ANGAL IN ANGAL NEBBI**

Through an MOU, CEIL collaborated with Amici di Angal to oversee the social project implemented within the community of Angal. Through this support the Amici di Angal which mainly supports Angal Hospital seeks to promote livelihood and welfare of the community's vulnerable in Angal. Their activities that CEIL oversees include the following:

- Support to the vulnerable orphans and the poorest within the community: through this activity, orphans are empowered financially to afford the basic needs so as to lead improved quality of life and enhance their acceptability within their homes. A total of 179 orphans benefit from this wonderful gesture.
- Support to the HIV clients is key to the social project intervention by the Amici di Angal. The intervention supported the poor, malnourished and weak of the clients. These clients are often subjected to strong medication due to their condition yet they cannot meaningfully engage in strong work to earn money for them selves. The intervention seeks to address this challenge for the most vulnerable of the clients within the community. The total number of beneficiaries in this intervention are 450.
- In addition to the support to the blind, is also motivating additional staff through salary to help the blind learn without interruptions. Supplementary food is also provided on termly basis for the blind Section to enable smooth learning for the pupils.
- Amici di Angal also supported an infant nursery school to grow as the bedrock of literacy and learning for the children of the community of Angal. The management of the school is supported financially on termly basis to run the school and subsidize the school fees charged. The school has 300 children, 31 of whom are on complete scholarship offered by the program.

- Youth groups are also supported in this social project by Amici di Angal. The group- Angal Youth Promotional Association has being empowered to engage in income generating activities such as bakery and other crafts making to earn income for self-reliance. This group has gained visibility within the trading center, (*photo below*).



### e) SENSITIZATION ON DISABILITY THROUGH SPORTS IN THE COMMUNITY

In addition to promoting sports in the inclusive schools, CEIL also promotes social intergration and sensitization on disability through sports in the community. In the year year 2017, CEIL planned to conduct such disability sports event in the town to enhance awarenes about disability rights, the opportunity occured when CEIL collaborated with CTEN- a community based organisation formed by South Sudanese Refugees to raise awareness and promote (*using sports*) a peaceful co-existence between the South Sudanese Refugees and the host Ugandan nationals.

To make it a colourfully inclusive event, CEIL, together with the host Arua District Union for Disability organised and supported the persons with disability to participate in the Refugee Road marathon activities of the year 2017. This participation gave the PWDs the opportunity to be part of the event that promoted intergration and peaceful co-existence between the south sudan refugees here in Arua and the citizens.

Activities of the day included a tri-cycle race by persons with physical disability in Arua town. Their participation highly promoted the inclusiveness and made the uniting event, a memorable one.

**f): LIVELIHOOD ENHANCEMENT THROUGH SIMPLE PRODUCTS PRODUCTION (IGA) BY THE DISABLED AND THE VULNERABLE WOMEN AND YOUTH**

Enhancing the livelihood of the vulnerable women youth and PWD beneficiaries was a central aspect of our interventions in the year 2017. We strongly believed that empowering the vulnerable but enterprising PWDs, women and youth in an inclusive setting is an appropriate way to promote self-reliance for them. We embarked on training selected beneficiaries on making simple craft products using their hands. They were identified with the help of the chairperson Arua district disability Union. Their composition was both disabled and non-disabled women and youth, hence inclusive.

With the help of an artisan, these beneficiaries learned to make a wide –range of products using their hands every Tuesdays and Thursdays. The location for their training and learning was the Social Centre veranda with the permission from the District Community Services department. All that was required of the individual beneficiaries was the willingness and determination to do something by themselves for self-reliance. After series of trainings in different artisan skills, committed members were eventually identified and trained further in business and marketing skills.

The following individuals mainly from Arua Municipality and the nearby sub-counties fully participated in the weekly trainings and enthusiastically acquired the artisan skills on which to build further for their own self-reliance. As CEIL we are satisfied with their zeal and determination to work hard against all odds for subsistence.

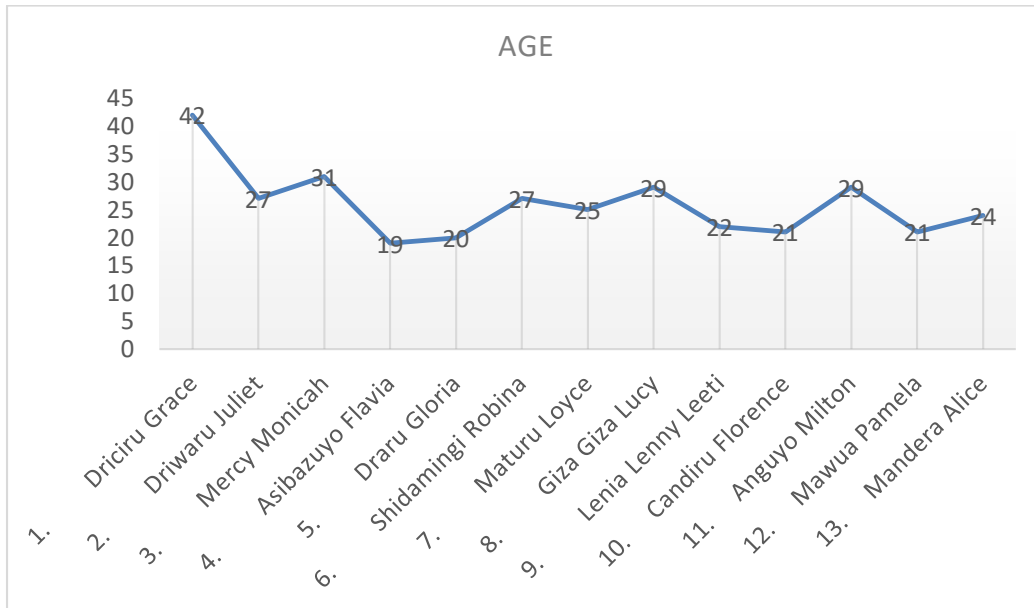

From the figure above, it is evident that the age bracket comprises people in whose hands responsibility lies most for basic needs in the homes either as parents or guardians. Three quarters of these beneficiaries are disabled, ranging from physical disability, visual impairment and hearing impairment. Others are parents or guardians of children with disabilities. In a biting economic situation such as ours today, given their vulnerability, it is no doubt that the gravity of the burden for needs of livelihood and survival for this section of our community is enormous, hence explaining the zeal with which they concentrated on learning skills for self-reliance even if the package we offered as CEIL was not exhaustive of what their capacity can accommodate!

They were eventually supported into forming themselves into association of thirteen (13) members known as “**Prosper Group**”. Through this association they hope to strengthen each other, work harder, and lobby as a group for other opportunities from well-wishers. As CEIL we shall promote the group further through start-up packages in form of materials for their artisan work as we call upon other actors and service providers such as the government, NGOs etc to come in and together we create a lasting positive impact on the lives of the marginalized, vulnerable yet enterprising group such as the Prosper Group!

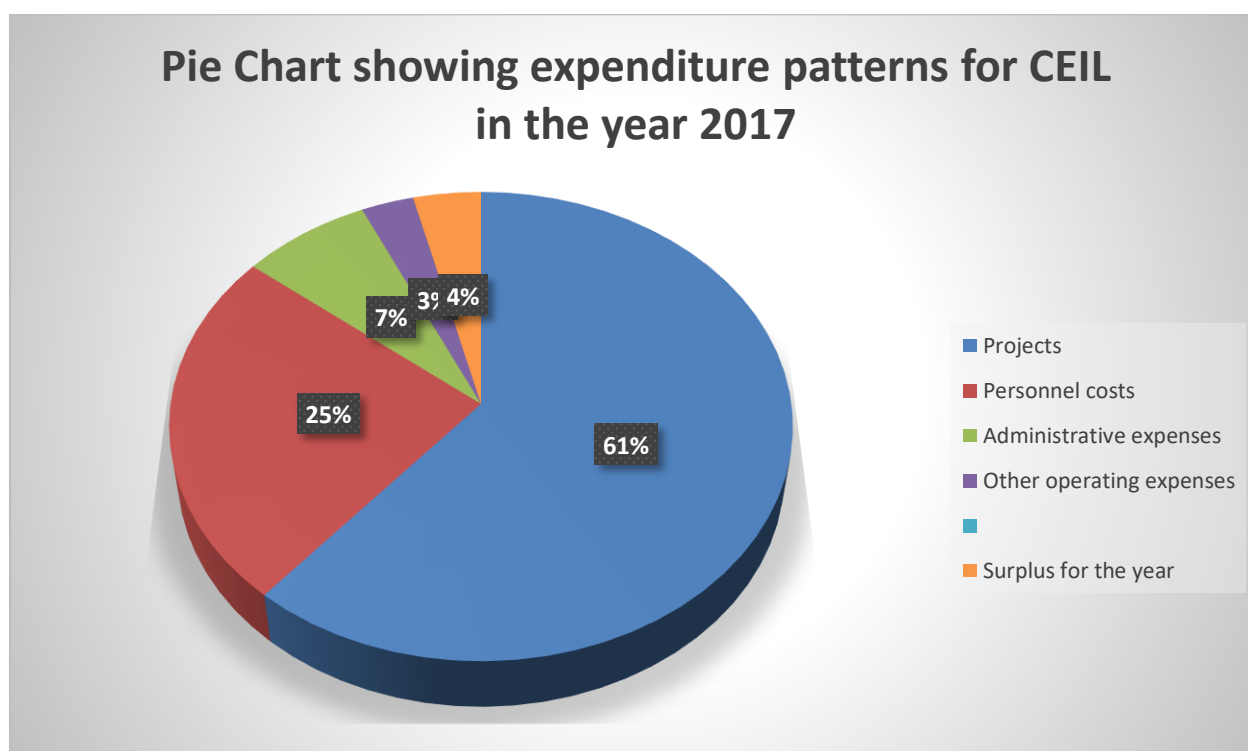

All relevant district departments and Community Service Directorates will continue to be our major partners for our inclusive activities and services

We strongly believe that addressing the needs of the society's vulnerable is collective responsibility of all to whom nature has entrusted some means to do so at individual, group or institutional level. We are interested to continue contributing towards achievement of some objectives of the national development plan (NDP), national health policy, and the national policy on disability as well as the United Nations Convention on Disability.

#### ***Conclusion***

CEIL believes in the inclusive approach to service delivery to the beneficiaries as a means to promote equalization of opportunities. We are cognizant that inclusion by all means requires empowering the disadvantaged of the society to fully embrace existing opportunities just like any other person in the community.
